



DEFINITION OF GRAPHIC NOVEL

- Stand-alone stories, not serialized, usually have a theme
- Written in comic book style
- They may be numbered or unnumbered
- May be compilations of previously published comic books or original works (or adaptations)
- Can be fiction or non-fiction
- Includes images integrated with text to provide a narrative that is richer than either element can provide alone

Graphic novels are stand-alone stories that are written in comic style.

They are often numbered but they do not have to be.

Graphic novels can be compilations of published comic books, original works, and/or adaptations, both fiction and non-fiction.

They are images with text; often the text is within a bubble.



Comic strips are panels of images with text in a strip that are serialized either daily or weekly (i.e., *Peanuts, Blondie, Beetle Bailey, For Better or For Worse*). Comic books are panels of images in serial form, often monthly and numbered that usually do not have a unique title (i.e., *The Amazing Super-Man, Archie*, etc.).

MANGA VS ANIME

Manga -- the American usage refers to Graphic novels originally published in Japan using the Japanese art form. Usually written back to front and right to left. Manga is a still image.


Anime -- animation originally created in Japan using the Japanese form of animation. Anime is a moving image.

Light Novel – Typically ranging about 950,000 words, light novels are commonly illustrated in a manga art style and are often adapted into manga and anime.

Manga refers to graphic novels originally published in Japan using the Japanese art form.

Anime is the Japanese animation art form.


A light novel is a novel using manga art with 50,000 words or less that were adapted from Manga or Anime. The majority of the novel is text as opposed to illustrations; therefore, they will not be cataloged as a graphic novel or a comic book, but rather a book.



Graphic novels can be cataloged as a monographic set or as a single record. That decision is based on what your library institution decides is the best course for their patrons and/or library online public catalog. The Illinois Heartland Library System (IHLS) has elected to catalog graphic novels as a single record. You will see both monographic set records and single records in OCLC for the same title(s) as shown in the graphics.

UNIQUE FIXED FIELD The fixed field Cont for Nature of Contents will be coded with a 6 for Comics/Graphic works							
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The Fixed Field element Cont (position 24) will always have the number 6 when cataloging a graphic novel or a comic book. From Bibliographic Formats and Standards (BFAS) Comics/Graphic novels: Instances of "sequential art" in which a story (whether fact or fiction) is told primarily through a set of images (often in the form of multiple "panels" per page) presented concurrently but meant to be "read" sequentially by the viewer. The accompanying narrative and/or dialog text, when it occurs, works integrally with the images to tell the story.




Graphic novels are often adaptations of previously written works. For example: Library wars, love & war is the creation of Hiro Arikawa with number 3 written by Kiiro Yumi and the English translation of Kiiro Yumi's work is by Kinami Watabe. The adaptation of the translated version of the original writing of number 3 by Kiiro Yumi was by Sean McCoy; therefore, Sean McCoy would be the preferred access point (MARC tag 100) since he adapted the work by another creator.

CATALOGING BEST PRACTICES 300 field use chiefly illustrations or chiefly color illustrations 600/650/651 fields – Free-floating subdivision Comic books, strips, etc. 655 fields – always include 655 _7 Graphic novels. ±2 lcgft 655 _7 Comics (Graphic works) ±2 lcgft

In the 300 tag, use the word chiefly since graphic novels consist mainly of illustrations. "Under the LCRI for AACR2 2.5C5, if the publication consisted wholly or predominantly of illustrations, the cataloger was instructed to give *all illustrations*, or *chiefly illustrations*, as appropriate. It is not entirely clear whether RDA allows phrasing of this kind; it appears that a note is preferable, although 'illustrations' alone would still be recorded in 300 with MARC tag 500 Chiefly illustration" (from https://web.library.yale.edu/book/export/html/145 6).

Best practice for IHLS is to use chiefly illustrations or chiefly color illustrations.



The free-floating form heading Comic books, strips, etc. should be added to all subject headings regardless as to whether the book is fiction or nonfiction, juvenile or adult.




Best practice for IHLS is to include both Graphic novels and Comics (Graphic works) as form headings on Graphic novels.

There are currently 42 possible genre terms for use in Graphic novel cataloging. These terms should be used when appropriate for the item you are cataloging.

Graphic novels have some specific contributors such as artists, colorist, and letterers. They often have translators as well. As stated earlier, they will also have adapters, but they are considered authors since they adapted an original work into a new work. In cases such as these, a 700 should also be included for the original creator.




Forgiveness is really strange is a non-fiction graphic novel written by Masi Noor and Marina Cantacuzino with art by Sophie Standing.


This record shows many of the items we have talked about. The fixed field Cont is coded with the 6 for Comics/Graphic novels, the MARC tag 300 has chiefly color illustrations, the free-floating subdivision Comic books, strips, etc. is used with each subject heading, the genre heading Psychological comics is present; as well as three form headings, the preferred Graphic novels, and Comics (Graphic works), but also, Nonfiction comics is present since this is a nonfiction graphic novel.



The Magicians is a novel by Lev Grossman and adapted by Lilah Sturges into a new work as a graphic novel with different parts. This graphic novel has an artist, a colorist, and a letterer that should have added personal name access.




In this record, Lilah Sturges would be in MARC tag 100 as the preferred access point, but the artist, colorist, and letterer should also have access points and the appropriate relator term. A note about the original creator can be given in a 500 note but they should also be recorded and given access in a 700 note with relationship information in subfield i.



Pride and prejudice is a graphic novel adapted by Stacy King from the Jane Austen novel. This graphic novel is geared toward a young adult audience.

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Pride and prejudice is a graphic novel geared to young adults and it is also in the Manga Classics series. MARC tag 300 will end in punctuation just like books since there is a 490/8XX and the Library of Congress form heading Young adult fiction has been added. Notice the 500 note that states that this book is read right to left and back to front.




Library wars. Love & war is a graphic novel series that originated in Japan in the anime format. These graphic novels were originally written as a light novel series. This type of graphic novel is often adapted from the original author's work and translated from Japanese to English. There are several volumes in this series. Library Wars is published by Viz as part of the Shojo Beat line.

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Since Library wars. Love & war was originally published in Japanese, but we are cataloging the English edition, MARC tags 041 and 546 are required. MARC tag 041 is stating that the item is in English, translated from the original Japanese. MARC tag 546 is stating the same concept in sentence form. You will want to include the edition statement Shojo beat edition. This book reads right to left as opposed to the American left to right.




The annotated *Sandman* is an interesting graphic novel since it was originally published in single magazine form. This graphic novel combines *The Sandman* magazine stories 57 through 75. Bibliographical references are also included in this graphic novel, so that information will need to be recorded in the bibliographic record.



Here we see the inclusion of the bibliographical references in the bibliographic record, and the statement from the title page verso stating that this graphic novel was originally issued in single magazine form. Also, this record shows some different relator terms, ones that are more commonly seen in book records, editor and writer of introduction, thus demonstrating the parallels between books and graphic novels.



Strange planet is actually a comic strip in the form of a book. Each page tells its own story often in 4 panels that are side by side reading left to right; however, Strange planet has 4 panels that are in block form, reading upper left to upper right to lower left to lower right.



The fixed field Cont will still be coded with a 6 for Comic/Graphic novels since this is a comic, but it is not considered a graphic novel. The free-floating subdivision Comic books, strips, etc. will also be included on all subject headings. Notice; however, that the form heading Graphic novels has not been added since this is not a graphic novel, but a book of comics.
